
General FWC Conservation Planning Philosophy:

- Input from stakeholders and the general public at the "front end" and continues throughout the planning process.
- Develop and utilize consensus of best-informed and most-interested minds available.
- Goals, objectives, challenges, and strategies drafted by area personnel.
- Reviews and approvals ensure compliance with laws, rules, agency responsibilities, and public desires.



Objective-based Vegetative Management (OBVM)





- FNAI natural communities inventory & mapping
- Historic natural communities mapping
- Rare plant, animal, and exotic species surveys & mapping



Establish clear and measurable <u>Desired Future</u> <u>Conditions</u> for natural plant communities



Desired Future Condition variables are management-dependant and easily measured

Groundcover




Example Desired Future Condition Overstory Variables:

- Canopy Species Richness
- Canopy Height
- Canopy Percent Cover
- Basal Area (all, long leaf pine, hardwoods)
- Stem Density







Monitor variables every 2-3 years

- Prescribed monitoring





Wildlife Conservation Prioritization and Recovery

The Strategy...


- Provides species assessments
- Describes necessary actions
- Describes necessary monitoring
- Influences work priorities
- Influences work plans
- Influences budget requests & allocations





Example Area Specific Strategy: Aucilla WMA

- Includes all listed species
- 15 of 60 focal species
- Evaluates area's overall role in wildlife conservation





Area Specific Strategy

Example Goal: establish and maintain a viable population of Bachman's sparrows that has the potential to function as part of a larger regional population





Area Specific Strategy

Example Objectives:

- Recruit a population of Bachman's sparrows on Aucilla WMA by 2018
- Detect presence of Bachman's sparrows on 30% of call stations in suitable habitat by 2028

Ten-year Management Plans

* Recent legislative changes require management plans to be even more precise in delineating, quantifying, and measuring management success and performance.

- Generate effective area <u>Management Intent</u>, <u>Goals</u> with <u>measurable Objectives</u> and <u>timelines for completion</u>, <u>Challenges</u> and <u>Strategies</u>, <u>cost estimates</u>.
- Integrate OBVM and WCPR
- Integrate a <u>Recreation Master Plan</u>
- Consider and address other important management issues and FWC initiatives



Management Plan Goal Categories (Ch 253.034 FS):

- **1. Habitat Restoration and Improvement**
- 2. Public access and recreational opportunities
- 3. Hydrological preservation and restoration
- 4. Sustainable forest management
- 5. Exotic and invasive species maintenance and control
- 6. Capital facilities and infrastructure
- 7. Cultural and historical resources
- 8. Imperiled species habitat maintenance, enhancement, restoration, or population restoration
- * Others as needed (e.g., Research Opportunities)



Example Goals and Objectives:

Habitat Restoration and Improvement Goal: Improve extant habitats and restore disturbed areas

Short-term

- Develop and implement a contract to survey, map, and describe historical and current natural communities. (January 2009 - June 2010).
- Develop a prescribed burn plan. (January 2009 June 2010)
- Develop and implement contract to survey and map exotics. (January 2009 – June 2010)
- Reintroduce prescribed fire to fire-adapted communities (~ 100 acres). (January 2009 – June 2010)
- Initiate treatment of exotic species (~10 acres). (January 2009 – June 2010)



Initiate restoration for ~50 acres of former row-crop fields. (January 2010 – June 2011)

Example Goals and Objectives:

 Habitat Restoration and Improvement Goal: Improve extant habitats and restore disturbed areas

Long-term

- Continue to use seasonally prescribed fire on a two to four year fire return interval on fire-adapted communities (~1,287 acres).
 (January 2009 January 2019)
- Continue treatment of exotic species as needed (~100 acres).
 (June 2010 January 2019)
- Continue restoration efforts for ~250 acres of former row-crop fields. (June 2011 – January 2019)
- Develop a comprehensive ground cover restoration plan. (January 2011 January 2013)
- Develop and implement OBVM and WCPR strategies. (January 2012 January 2019)



Conduct a mechanical thinning of overstocked stand of mixedpine and hardwoods (~40 acres). (January 2013 – January 2015)

- Land Management Reviews every five years
- <u>FWC accomplishment report</u> included in updated Management Plans


